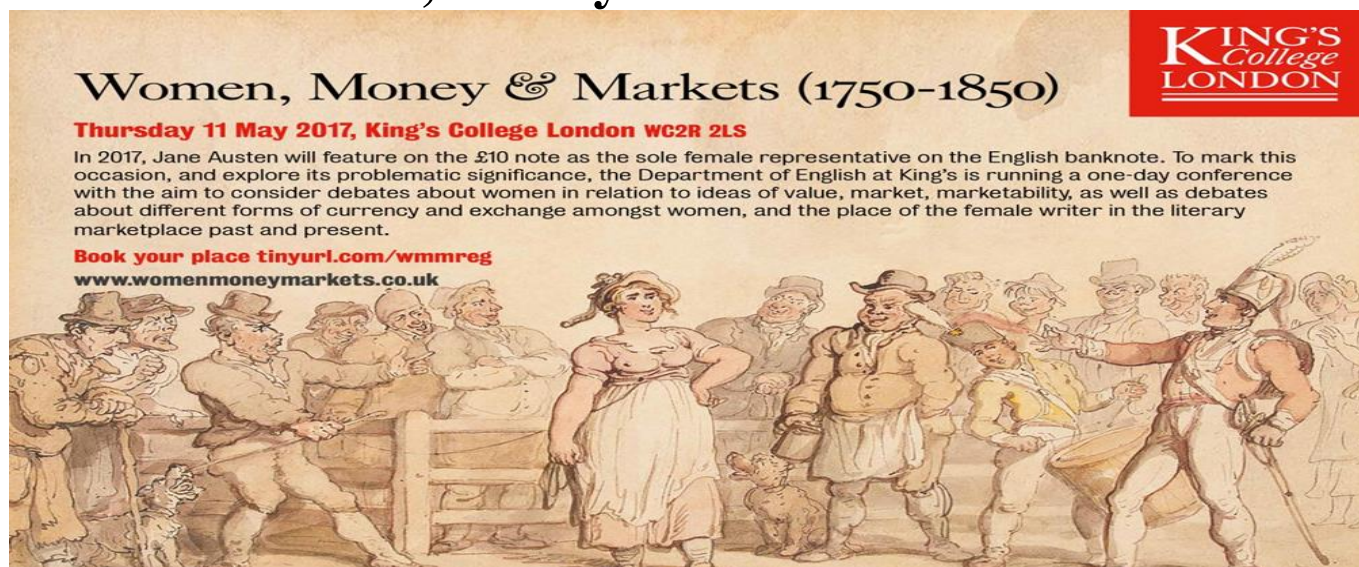


YSI @ Women, Money and Markets Conference

Gender Economics

*Migration, asylum, war, global crises, financial markets, employment, growth, media, arts, history, policies, welfare state and social investments, institutions, health, climate change and environment are all gendered, because **gender relations work in all spheres of life**. A gender perspective means testing conventional disciplinary boundaries and developing **alternative methodologies** involving interactions with other categories of analysis such as **race, ethnicity, class and sexuality**.*

The working group focuses on gender issues in a **critical, transnational** and **interdisciplinary** perspective. Specifically, the working group aims at redefining gender analysis outside of its traditional boundaries, exploring an **alternative social economic thinking**, as well as **new** perspectives of the current economic and political predicament at both European and international level. Our work will develop around three broad areas:

- Gender and social policy;
- Gender and globalization - migration, crises, finance and microfinance;
- Gender and culture - representation, narrative and arts.

- Webinars: young scholars research presentations
- Creation and development of a network of researchers and practitioners engaged on gender from several perspectives
